Congratulations for completing a previous semester of More Life evangelism training and for making a commitment to further growth as a Great Commission Christian through More Life Discipleship. In the More Life Evangelism Training you learned the importance of praying for the Lost and what it means to be on mission with Christ. You also learned how to share your story and how to use the More Life Transfer Guide. You gained valuable experience in making the most of evangelistic opportunities, as well as in sharing More Life in everyday situations. You learned and practiced additional skills in using the More Life Transfer Guide.

Remember the More Life Transfer Guide is designed to be more than a tract. It allows you, the user, to transfer the conversation and the decisions to be made to whatever is needed in the life of the person to whom you have made a connection. Example: If they are already a baptized church member but have never connected with a small group. The More Life Guide allows you to move the conversation to that decision point. Example: They may have made a decision as a child. You've heard their testimony and they are truly a believer but they have never been baptized by immersion. The More Life Guide allows you to move them to that decision and even record that decision to give to your church for follow-up.

Following is a suggested approach in using the More Life Transfer Guide and taking a person through it. In speaking with someone you wish to witness to, ask, "What do you understand it takes for a person to have More Life here and go to Heaven when they die?" Listen, and then proceed. "May I share with you how you may experience life to the fullest?" Proceed to use the More Life Transfer Guide.

Read the section **Sin**. Say, "Our sin causes a separation from God, but Jesus paid for the guilt of our sin."

Read the section **The Gift**. Ask, "What hope does man have if he doesn't receive God's gift of More Life?" Listen for response.

Read the **Turn**. Say, "This gift isn't ours automatically. We must be willing to turn from our sin." Say, "Look at the greatness of God's love."

Read the section **The Way**. Ask, “Does this make sense to you?” Listen. Ask, “Is there any reason why you couldn’t receive God’s gift of eternal life?” Listen. Ask, “Does this prayer express how you want to respond to God?”

Read the prayer. If they are ready, say, “I would like to pray this prayer with you,” and immediately bow your head and proceed in thanking God that they want Jesus in their life. Then encourage them to pray or lead them offering the written prayer to God.

Not everyone will be ready to receive Christ.

If the person is not ready to invite Jesus into their life, encourage them by letting them know you do not have to be present when they give their life to Jesus. When they sense Him speaking to them and they understand they need Him, they can pray anywhere and receive Christ as their Savior and Lord. You may say, “I would like to pray,” and immediately bow your head and thank God that they were gracious to allow you to share Christ with them and that they will soon open their heart to Him and enjoy the More Life that He has planned for them.

Remember it is a glorious victory just to share the gospel, whether anyone does or does not pray to receive Christ.

If the person does pray to receive Christ, follow up with the emphasis on Baptism, Connecting with a Church, and getting involved with a Bible Study Group.

Say: The following is important to help you to obey Christ and grow in your faith. Then, read the part of the Transfer Guide that speaks of Baptism, Belonging to a Church and Groups. You will want to take it **one section at a time**.

After the baptism section, you may ask: “Is there a local church that you are familiar with, where you might want to be baptized?” Listen... then explain the importance of being a part of a local church. Emphasize the importance of a church that faithfully teaches the truths of the Bible. You will want to invite the individual to attend church with you if you live in the same local area. Or, you may make suggestions of a faithful Bible teaching church.

Again, emphasize that it is an act of love to share with a person how they can be saved and have eternal life. We are not trying to manipulate the person, but rather offering them the greatest gift in the world...the Savior, Jesus Christ! Why should that be so difficult?

More Life Discipleship: Doctrine of God

Learner's Guide Lesson 2: The Nature and Essence of God

1- LISTEN: (What Does God's Word say about my life?)

How long would it take to drink the ocean dry with a coffee cup? I think you would agree it would be impossible. This question is one that hopefully opens our minds to the awe of God. To know God is an unending task like drinking the ocean dry, because no matter how much we experience the mystery of God, there is always so much more to know and learn and experience. God, while He can be known through Christ and experienced every day, still remains the greatest mystery known to man. God, in Isaiah 55:9, tells us His ways and thoughts are higher than heaven is above the earth.

Men have been trying to shape God in their own image or the image of animals or other creatures from the beginning but these are not God, only idols. Aren't you glad that the God of the universe is greater than anything you can imagine; bigger than our mind can comprehend? How can we know someone who is so far beyond us as humans? The way we can know God, and who He is, is by His revelation of Himself to us. God, while a mystery, is also knowable.

Read Isaiah 6:1-8 and look at the revelation of God to a man named Isaiah. Isaiah became a great prophet of God but his knowledge of God began with the first step or first drink. The setting of this was that Uzziah, king of Israel, had brought stability to the kingdom for 52 years. He had died and God used that event to reveal Himself as the eternal God. God does not need anyone or anything for Him to exist. In Exodus 3:14 God told Moses to tell the children of Israel that the one who sent him to deliver them out of bondage was I AM THAT I AM. This means God is self-existent, self-sufficient and inexhaustible. He is unchangeable in His nature.

Looking again at Isaiah 6 we see that God is superior to the angels in heaven, and in fact, is worshipped by them. They cry out that God is Holy. Some see the three cries of Holy as the trinity of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and their divine essence. The nature of God is that He is Holy. Holy usually means pure and righteous but it also has a deeper meaning of separation. God is above all of His creation and separate from it as Creator. He is also referred to as the LORD of hosts which denotes that He is the Lord over all the armies of heaven.

Another thing we see here is the earth is full of His glory, meaning His majesty, splendor, beauty and wonder. We see in Romans 1:20 that the things visible declare the invisible God. In fact, the whole earth is filled with His glory because the earth and all of creation moves inside the very being of the all-powerful God. The heavens declare His glory.

Imagine the raw power of the ocean. Waves crash into the shores with awesome power but it is God who tells them where to stop. (See Job 38:8-11) The sun burns with intense heat but is small in comparison to the might of some stars. It is God who displays His awesome power in a thunderstorm, earthquake or hurricane. Still all these powerful things we see are small in might when compared to the omnipotent Almighty God of creation. We see this in the revelation of God to Isaiah when it says the doorposts shook and the house filled with smoke. This smoke gives us an image of the glory of God filling the

More Life Discipleship: Doctrine of God Learner's Guide Lesson 3: The One True God

1- LISTEN: (What Does God's Word say about my life?)

Our world is full of what we refer to as generics, often called knockoffs. We have generic medicine, generic shampoo, peanut butter and a multitude of other things. For every designer purse or expensive wrist watch there is a knock off or an imitation. We even have fake diamonds. It is hard to know what is true and what is untrue. In the spiritual realm there is a lot of confusion as well. The enemy of God, Satan, wants to confuse us with all kinds of philosophies and religious distractions (see Colossians 2:8) so we will not realize there is one true God.

The setting of our focus text is that Paul is on a missionary journey. He is in the city of Athens, which was the center of world learning at the time. Read Acts 17:16-34 and notice what he observed as he walked around the city. Paul noticed that they worshipped a lot of false gods. The Greeks were a very polytheistic people and had many mythological gods they worshipped. There were two philosophies that dominated the spiritual landscape. One was the Epicureans whose goal was pleasure without worrying about truth. The Stoics believed in a world void of passion and affections that was ruled by fate. The two were part of a group called the Areopagus which, with a thumbs up or thumbs down could determine the fate of any man who argued with them. Paul literally placed his life in peril to witness to them and tell them of the only God there was; the one they were ignorant of.

Paul taught them that the one true God could be known. He taught about Jesus but notice what they called him. In the KJV and NJKV it says, "babblers," HCSB says, "pseudo-intellectual." The Greek word according to Strong's Dictionary is *sper-mol-og'-os*. It means "a seed picker (as the crow), that is, (figuratively) a sponger, loafer (specifically a gossip or trifler in talk): - babbler." This picture is a bird in the cow pasture picking seeds from the cow dung. Paul chose not to take offense at this.

When he stood on Mars Hill, he spoke of the statue they had "TO THE UNKNOWN GOD". He used the things in their culture to instruct them. It is apparent they wanted to cover all bases and not offend any god but by this very act indicated they were ignorant that there is only one God. He declared that God is not something made by the hands of man and that God does not need anything from mankind. In Acts 17:25 he tells them that God is the one who gives breath and life to men. This taught that God was a very personal God who was involved in the minute by minute affairs of mankind. He declared that God is not some mythical creature that is unknowable but in fact we live, move and exist within God. He used their own secular poet to connect their philosophy to the living God.

In Acts 17:30-31 Paul taught them that this formerly unknown god that he declared to them as the one true God had been verified by the resurrection of Jesus. Paul called them to repentance and to turn away from idols and false gods. Their reaction was divided because some believed but some wanted to delay a decision and hear him speak again.

This declaration of Paul to these Greeks was a bold witness. Not only here in this passage, throughout, the Bible clearly teaches that there is only one God and that He will not condone and share worship with false idols of stone, gold, silver or any other type of natural material or images of philosophy.

2. INVENTORY (How does this apply to my life?)

Paul called them to assess their life and to turn to the one true God. Does the risk he took to teach about the truth of God challenge you to be more bold in your faith and witness? What are some things you see that can apply to your life from this lesson?

What results was Paul seeking from the Greeks?

3- FORSAKE (What areas of my life need to be adjusted?)

List some things that can come between men and God. Which of these do you struggle with most?

How deep is the conviction in your heart that there is one and only one true God? Use the following to circle your level of certainty. (Do not give the answer you know is desired but how you really feel)

4- EXPLORE (What life action should I take?)

Look back over the focal scripture and ask:

- How would I have reacted to what Paul taught?
- What areas do I need to strengthen in my faith in the absolute one true God?
- If you have doubt, what is causing the doubt? What do you need to do to strengthen your faith?

Look at Romans 10:17 and write out an action plan to strengthen your faith.

Use the L.I.F.E. outline to explore Isaiah 46:9-10. What do these verses declare about God? God clearly claims that there is no other God. That we have no other gods is also the first of the Ten Commandments. What are some gods that in our modern culture we need to avoid? Remember anything we place before God is an idol or false god.

More Life Discipleship: God the Son

Student Lesson 4: God's One and Only Son

1. LISTEN (What God's Word says for my life?)

Every person must decide what he or she believes about Jesus Christ. Some may decide to ignore Him; others may decide that He was a great moral teacher, but wasn't God; and some will believe He was who he claimed to be, God's one and only son. Read John 3:1-18. Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews, was puzzled as to Jesus' true nature. He knew Jesus "came from God" but he did not possess the faith to believe Jesus was the messiah. He may have come to Jesus asking questions that were haunting him. Although others in the Sanhedrin had questions as well, Nicodemus was the only one of his peers to have the courage to approach Jesus. He may have brought such questions as, "By what authority do you do these things? What is your true purpose? Do you have some new truth to reveal?"

Knowing what was in Nicodemus' heart, Jesus moves quickly to address his questions by conveying truth. He uses three common earthly realities to illustrate His true purpose and believing faith: giving birth, baptism through water, and the wind.

Jesus revealed that believing faith was like a new birth; a new beginning; a new direction. The transformation of one's life through belief on Jesus Christ (being born again) is necessary to gain eternal life. *"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new* (2 Corinthians 5:17 NKJV).

Nicodemus knew of John's baptism with water so Jesus used this knowledge to introduce the concept of baptism by the Spirit. When Jesus was baptized God's Spirit descended upon Him (Matthew 3:16). The apostle Paul clearly taught that we receive the Holy Spirit the moment we receive Jesus Christ as our Savior (1 Corinthians 12:13) and a person does not belong to Christ unless he or she possesses the Spirit of God (Romans 8:9).

Jesus described the Spirit of God like the wind. Through experience, Nicodemus could not see the wind but was convinced of its reality because he could hear the sound of it and see its results. In God's sovereignty, the Spirit moves, convicts and saves. Believers know of the Spirit through faith as God reveals Himself. Ephesians 1:13-14 teaches that the Holy Spirit is the seal of salvation for all those who believe: *"Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory."*

Finally, Jesus uses another known symbol, Moses' snake, to illustrate the true purpose of His life on earth. Jesus must die on the cross (be lifted up as the snake was lifted by Moses – Numbers 21:4-9). In the same way the ugliness of a snake brought salvation to the Israelites, the ugliness of the cross brings salvation to sinners. Exercising belief in Jesus brings about eternal life. The Jews understood that through the law of Moses a sacrifice must be made for the forgiveness of sin; not just any sacrifice, but a perfect sacrifice (Jesus sinless life made Him the perfect sacrifice for man's sins – 1 Peter 1:18, 19; 2 Cor. 5:21). Our belief in God's one and only Son is the way to eternal life (John 3:16).

2. INVENTORY (How does this apply to my life?)

Verse 8 of John 3 describes a life born of the Spirit. Name some characteristics of a person who is born of the Spirit? Are these characteristics present in your life?

Verse 17 points out that non-believers are condemned. What should be our attitude or desire for those who are non-believers?

3. **FORSAKE** (What areas of my life need to be adjusted?)

Nicodemus was a man seeking after the truth. Many times we are isolated from non-believers. What are some intentional steps you can take to build relationships with those seeking the truth (non-believers)?

Think about the number of times in the past year you have actually shared the gospel with a non-believer. What are some ways to increase opportunities to share the gospel with others?

4. **EXPLORE** (What life actions should I take?)

In John 3:1-18 Jesus gives us a perfect example of a witnessing encounter. Are you prepared to introduce someone to God's one and only Son? Here are some preparation steps:

- Know the Plan of Salvation and rehearse sharing it with someone.
- Make a list of non-believers and begin praying for them.
- Look for opportunities to build relationships with non-believers on your list.
- Ask God to open the door for you to share the gospel.
- Think of other preparation steps to take:

More Life Training is great preparation for witnessing encounters. If you haven't already, plan to take a Witnessing Training Course. Make sure the course offers actual practice in witnessing. Becoming comfortable sharing the gospel takes time and experience. There is no greater reward than allowing God to use you to introduce His Son to others.

More Life Discipleship: God the Son Student Lesson 5: Jesus, Our Mediator

1. LISTEN (What God's Word says for my life?)

What is a mediator? A mediator is a person who intervenes between two parties in order to bring about an agreement. The two parties may have a dispute where the disagreement causes neither party the ability to objectively work towards a solution on their own. There is a need for a mediator to help both sides see the other's viewpoint and make compromises that lead to a settlement. A gifted mediator can help mend relationships before they are broken beyond repair. Unfortunately, in many situations, a mediator is sought too late in the process.

Why do we need a mediator to mend our relationship with God? Our relationship with God is broken because of sin. Sin is the transgression of God's law (1 John 3:4) and everyone has sinned (Romans 3:10, 23). God hates our sin and sin stands between God and us. While our relationship with God is broken by sin we are under an eternal judgment. The only just penalty for this sin is death (Romans 6:23), not just physical death but eternal death (Revelation 20:11-15). We are at a place where nothing we can do is sufficient to mend our broken relationship with God. Without a proper mediator, we are destined to spend eternity in hell (Isaiah 64:6).

Why is Christ the only perfect mediator between mankind and God? Read 1 Timothy 2:3-6. The Bible teaches that Christ is the only one worthy of being our mediator. He mediates for us much like a defense lawyer mediates for his client. However, there is a distinct difference; our defense attorney took the penalty of death for us (Hebrews 9:15)! Jesus exchanged our sin for His righteousness (2 Corinthians 5:21). But what makes Christ worthy to be our mediator?

Christ is the perfect mediator because He is divine. The Bible affirms the preexistence of Christ (John 1:1-2). The Bible also identifies Christ as the agent of creation (John 1:3). According to Colossians 1:17, Christ is the Lord over all creation, holding the entire universe together. When Jesus declared, "I and the Father are one" (John 10:30), He was saying that He and the Father are of one nature and essence. John 8:58 is another example. Jesus declared, "I tell you the truth, before Abraham was born, I am!" Jesus is full deity and one with God.

Christ is the perfect mediator because He is a faultless human being. Christ coming in human form is called the incarnation. As John stated, "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). Jesus was a perfect human being without "defect or blemish" (1 Peter 1:19). The teaching of the Bible is clear; Jesus was without sin (Hebrews 4:15).

Christ is the perfect mediator because He is acceptable to God. Since Jesus was perfect He could become our propitiation for sin (Romans 3:25-26). Propitiation simply means that God's just demands for holiness and punishment for sin must be satisfied. Jesus' work on the cross satisfied the requirements of God's justice and canceled the guilt of man. God demanded a perfect sacrifice in blood, and in His love and mercy provided that sacrifice in the person of Jesus Christ (Romans 5:8). Further proof of Jesus' acceptability is His resurrection from the dead. The resurrection of Christ is the basis of our hope and victory over sin. Paul declared, "if Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless; you are still in your sins" (1 Cor. 15:17).

2. **INVENTORY** (How does this apply to my life?)

What are some circumstances where people would find mediation to be helpful and needed?

Describe a time in your life where mediation helped mend a relationship?

3. **FORSAKE** (What areas of my life need to be adjusted?)

Look up the following scriptures: John 1:1-2; John 8:56, 58; John 10:30; Revelation 22:13. How would you use these verses to explain to someone Jesus' preexistence?

Philippians 2:7 states that Jesus "emptied Himself by assuming the form of a slave, taking on the likeness of men." Why would Jesus take on human form and how does this make you feel that He became your mediator?

4. **EXPLORE** (What life actions should I take?)

As fully divine, Jesus could not and did not sin. Yet His human nature could be tempted. The sinlessness of Jesus paid the price for sin and offers all people eternal life (John 3:16; Ephesians 2:8-9). He is not a way to eternal life, but claims, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). Further, there is no other option for salvation. Jesus is the only name under heaven through which people can be saved (Acts 4:12). Only a sinless, perfect Jesus could both pay the price for sin and offer others forgiveness and eternal life.

We live in a culture where people believe there are many roads that lead to heaven. Write down some bullet points that you would cover while explaining to someone why Jesus is the only mediator between God and us:

More Life Discipleship: The Holy Spirit

Student Lesson 6: The Holy Spirit: Our Counselor

1. LISTEN (What God's Word says for my life?)

Have you ever needed any help while doing things like working on your car or fixing supper? When you realized that you needed assistance, what person came to your mind? Did you call that person and ask for help? That's exactly what God does for us in the Holy Spirit. He provides us the help we need.

In John 16:5-16, Christ lets us know how He goes about getting us the help we need. He states that "It is for your benefit that I go away." How was that going to help them or us? Jesus came to provide a way to forgiveness (Mark 10:45). He lets His disciples know that after He is resurrected, He, Christ, would send the Helper (Counselor) to them.

In the same way a prosecutor presents his case in a trial, the Holy Spirit presents three elements: the charge, the standard, and the rationale for a judge's ruling. As the Holy Spirit works in our life, He presents the charge: sin. Each person must realize that the sin is not believing in Christ (John 3:18). The reason sin reigns in a person's life is because there is no Faith in Christ. The Holy Spirit wants to present that evidence in your heart and in my heart to bring us to a place of conviction, and that, of course, means a place of decision. Next the Holy Spirit wants us to see the standard: righteousness. Christ not only shows us our sin, but His righteousness. If we are to stand before God, we must be in Christ since He is our righteousness. Finally, the rationale: a case is made for the judge to make a decision. The rationale is straightforward. Satan was judged on the cross and embarrassed by the Resurrection. The Holy Spirit uses these three elements to help us live each day.

But He does more, so much more. In verses 13-15, Christ points out five more things the Holy Spirit does. First, He guides us into all truth. If you've ever been lost, you know how valuable this is to you. The Holy Spirit doesn't just guide you to the building of truth, He gets you **into** truth. Once you are there, he secondly gets you the word you need to hear. 'He shall not speak of himself.' He gets His word from the top – Christ. Third, he gives you help for today and every day. Fourth, the Holy Spirit will give you a glory stumping time. As He will lift up Christ, you can glorify Christ. In your heart you will say, 'Look what the Lord hath done.' Fifth, the Holy Spirit will take from Christ and give to you everything you need each day.

Christ wanted His disciples and us today to know: While I'm gone, I've got a Helper for you. But don't forget we will see each other again.

So don't try life on your own, let the Holy Spirit help.

2. **INVENTORY** (How does this apply to my life?)

Be the prosecutor in your life. Ask yourself what charge can the Holy Spirit use to help me see myself in a right way? How can I be right with God? Do I know that the prince of this world has been judged?

Have I let the Holy Spirit guide me into truth and get me His word I need to give me help for today and tomorrow? Am I having a glory stumping time with Christ? Do I let the Holy Spirit get from Christ and give to me what I need?

3. **FORSAKE** (What areas of my life need to be adjusted?)

Is there anything that blocks my awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence in my life? If there is, what it is?

4. **EXPLORE** (What life actions should I take?)

Be aware of the Holy Spirit's presence.

Be aware of sin that the Holy Spirit convicts of each day.

Be convicted that Christ is right and I am right only in Him.

Be aware of the truth the Holy Spirit is leading me to each day.

Be happy by glorifying Christ

Be aware that I am a better witness for Christ, if I am aware of the Holy Spirit's power in my life.

Make a list today of how the Holy Spirit is guiding my life.

Use L.I.F.E. outline to explore John 16:5-16. Some say the Holy Spirit is just emotion. How do these verses disprove that?



Student Lesson 7: The Wisdom of God

1. LISTEN (What God's Word says for my life?)

After you came to know Christ as your Savior, have you ever approached someone to share your faith? How did you do it? Did you use big words? Or did you just try to let them know that the Holy Spirit inside of you was the source of change in your life? That's what Paul did when He went to Corinth. In I Corinthians 2, we read how Paul shared how he found the Wisdom for life. He did not attempt to show how smart he was or even how sharp He was. He shared the testimony of God.

The only way Paul could do that was 'to determine to know nothing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified.' The most important key to being an effective witness is your testimony about Christ's work in your life. But how was Paul going to carry out this witness? How do you show to your friends and family what Christ has done for you?

The answer is simple. Do what Paul did! Depend on the demonstration of the Spirit and not on a demonstration of your speech. Show that your faith is based not on men's wisdom, but on God's power. Trust the wisdom that the experts here don't know God's wisdom.

God wants to give you a wisdom that comes from Him. His wisdom is hidden from anyone that doesn't know Him. It's not who you are. It's who you know. Paul wanted everyone to know that with this wisdom you will know what to do with Christ. This wisdom was prepared by the Father, carried out by the Son, and applied by the Spirit. With the Wisdom of God your eyes and ears will be open to see what God has prepared for those who love Him.

The key is the Spirit. God reveals these things to us through the Spirit. If you need guidance, the Spirit will search the way God wants you to go. Don't try to overthink this. You don't know the thoughts of God, but the Spirit of God does.

This is not something you learn at school. The Spirit teaches spiritual things to spiritual people.

One of two things is true. You are natural person, meaning you are person born into this World, but not borne into God's kingdom. As result you cannot know what God can do for you. You may even think that Bible makes no sense to me. It's foolishness. Or you are spiritual person who can see things through the work of Christ.

You might be saying, 'I'll never understand how to live my life.' My response is I know who can instruct you in every way. You can understand life by letting Christ through the work of the Holy Spirit give you His mind. Then you will start thinking like Christ. You will have the Wisdom of God.

2. **INVENTORY** (How does this apply to my life?)

Would you say you are a know-it-all? Or would you say I am learning to know-it-all? Paul was a very smart man but he shared some things he had learned about being a witness for God. What did you learn about the work of the Holy Spirit from what He shared in I Corinthians 2?

What is difference between a carnal man and a spiritual man? Which one do you want to be? Why? How does the Holy Spirit work in a person life to be a spiritual man?

3. **FORSAKE** (What areas of my life need to be adjusted?)

What do I need to unlearn in order to see the Wisdom of God lived out in my life? What things hinder my mind from allowing the Holy Spirit to guide me into all truth?

4. **EXPLORE** (What life actions should I take?)

As the Holy Spirit leads, I will make changes to what I read.

As the Holy Spirit leads, I will make changes to what I see.

As the Holy Spirit leads, I will make changes to where I go.

As the Holy Spirit leads, I will make changes to who I listen to.

With these 4 changes in mind, in what ways I will change in order to clearly know the Mind of God and have the Wisdom of God.

Review of the More Life Evangelism

- Why is knowing God in the relationship of salvation life's greatest blessing!
- You have the opportunity of communicating their story in a clear way that will help others know the power of Christ to transform a person's life.
 - While our salvation experience and relationship with Christ is personal, it is not private. We have been joined to Christ to be on mission with him...after the Lost.
 - What evidence do you give that you are on mission with Christ after the Lost? Is it enough evidence to convict you if you were on trial for being a witness for Christ?
 - The task of being on mission with Christ cannot be successful without the power of Christ. Prayer must be a vital part of our lives as we wrestle in spiritual battle for the souls of men. We also have been directed to pray for laborers in the harvest (Matthew 9:35-38). We can do nothing without Him!
 - The Gospel must be clearly presented so those we share with will understand their lostness and the hope of experiencing Life in Christ. Thus, there is an urgency for us to be intentional in being relational with others, looking for the open door to present this Good News.
 - The more we share Christ, the more comfortable we will become in sharing Christ. The more we share Christ, the more people we will see come to Christ. We cannot make people repent and follow Christ. We can share the truth of the Gospel and invite them to turn from sin and follow Him.
 - Live as one sent by Jesus into the harvest field. The only way to fail is to not obey in going!

Remember the purpose of the class is not to be proficient in "learning lessons," but to become equipped in being faithful followers of Christ who are on mission with Him, enjoying seeing Him glorified as others experience More Life.
